CHIEF EDITOR'S REMARKS

It is with great pleasure that I present this Special Issue of the **Journal of Building and Land Development (JBLD)**, published in commemoration of **ARU Week 2026**, Ardhi University's flagship institutional platform for showcasing scholarly excellence, technological innovation, applied research, and professional practice. This Special Issue represents a significant scholarly milestone in the continued growth of JBLD and reflects Ardhi University's enduring commitment to research excellence, multidisciplinary scholarship, knowledge dissemination, and innovation-led development. The theme of this Special Issue, **"Innovation and Knowledge Advancement in Smart Sustainable Cities and Integrated Development Systems,"** reflects the urgent need for integrated, evidence-based, and multidisciplinary approaches to addressing contemporary development challenges within the built and natural environments. The selected contributions illustrate the breadth of scholarship emerging from fields central to Ardhi University's academic mandate and demonstrate the transformative role of research and innovation in shaping sustainable futures.

This Special Issue presents seven peer-reviewed scholarly contributions spanning diverse but interconnected domains. The opening paper, **Assessment of Environmental Safeguard Integration in Land Tenure Regularization Using GIS Suitability Analysis and Ground Verification: Evidence from Mbarali District, Tanzania**, addresses the increasingly important intersection between land governance, environmental stewardship, and spatial decision-making. By integrating GIS-based suitability analysis with field verification, the study highlights the importance of incorporating environmental safeguards into land regularization processes to support sustainable land administration and planning. The second paper, **IoT-Based Real-Time Water Quality Monitoring System: Design, Development, and Deployment: A Case Study at Ardhi University, Tanzania**, presents a practical technological innovation in environmental monitoring and smart systems development. The

study demonstrates how Internet of Things (IoT) technologies can support real-time environmental data acquisition, decision support, and improved water resource management, contributing to the growing discourse on digital transformation and smart infrastructure systems.

The third contribution, **Smart Diet Diary: Design and Development of a Mobile Application for Child Nutrition Guidance in Tanzania**, extends the innovation agenda into digital public health and mobile technology applications. Although outside traditional built environment boundaries, the paper demonstrates the multidisciplinary nature of innovation and the potential for digital tools to address social development challenges through accessible, technology-driven interventions. The fourth paper, **Reframing Cost Information in EPC+F Road Projects in Tanzania: A Conceptual Review of Financial Risk Visibility and Infrastructure Bankability**, contributes to the important discourse on infrastructure financing, project governance, and financial risk management. By examining Engineering, Procurement, Construction and Financing (EPC+F) project structures, the study provides valuable conceptual insights into how improved cost transparency and risk visibility can enhance infrastructure bankability and investment confidence.

The fifth paper, **Assessment of Disaster Risk Preparedness and Response in Public Markets in Dar es Salaam City, Tanzania**, addresses a critical urban resilience challenge, focusing on preparedness, institutional capacity, emergency response systems, and vulnerability management in dense public commercial environments. The study reinforces the need for improved disaster risk governance and proactive resilience planning in rapidly growing urban centres. The sixth contribution, **Valorisation of Faecal Sludge-Derived Bio-Briquette Ash as a Potential Supplementary Cementitious Material for Sustainable Construction**, presents an innovative and highly relevant contribution at the intersection of sanitation management, waste valorisation, circular economy, and sustainable construction engineering. By exploring alternative construction material pathways from waste-derived resources, the study reflects the increasing importance of resource recovery and environmentally responsible engineering innovation.

The seventh paper, **Assessment of Urban Fire Risk Management in Dar es Salaam City**, complements the disaster resilience theme by examining emergency response capacity, fire risk governance, institutional preparedness, and operational challenges in urban fire management. The paper provides important evidence for strengthening urban emergency systems and resilience planning in rapidly urbanizing African cities. Collectively, these contributions demonstrate that innovation is multidimensional. It encompasses not only technological advancement, but also governance reform, institutional strengthening, digital transformation, sustainability transitions, infrastructure resilience, environmental stewardship, and evidence-based policy development.

This Special Issue further reflects the importance of interdisciplinary collaboration across academic units, research domains, and professional disciplines. The diversity of topics underscores Ardhi University's expanding research ecosystem and the growing importance of scholarly publishing as a vehicle for translating innovation into actionable knowledge. It is important to note that while this Special Issue presents manuscripts successfully processed within the ARU Week 2026 publication schedule, other additional manuscripts submitted under the Special Issue call remain under peer review and editorial processing. Upon satisfactory completion of the review process, eligible manuscripts will be considered for publication in subsequent regular issues of JBLD. Beyond this Special Issue, the Journal of
